MISSION AND OUTREACH:

Ecclesia Ministries, modeled on Common Cathedral in Boston, is a service held outdoors for a homeless congregation. Every Sunday at 2:00 in Madison Square Park, a group of homeless men and women gather in a semi-circle around a portable altar for prayer, song, and to receive the sacrament. A priest from a supportive, housed congregation, like St Ignatius, leads the service, and there are parishioners from those housed congregations who come to participate in the service and in fellowship. Following the service, sandwiches, fruit and cookies are shared from the same altar, and everyone just hangs out and visits. There is the distinct feeling that this is a congregation: people who know and care for each other, and who keep their eyes open for new people to attract in.

St Ignatius hosts the first Sunday of every month. Why not consider joining us for one Sunday, this fall, winter or spring? It is a moving experience—truly living out Jesus' directive to "feed my sheep." It enriches the worship we have here at church by extending that love of God out to the margins of society.

Equally helpful would be to volunteer in preparing the food which we serve in the Park: to come for an hour on any first Saturday of the month to the Undercroft to make sandwiches or to help us on that Sunday between the two masses to pack up the food.



Recommended Children's Books From Constance Vidor:


I Believe: the Nicene Creed

Beautifully illustrated book presentation of the creed. The last page presents a brief history of the creed.




The Lord's Prayer by Tim Ladwig
