

And then they will see the Son of man coming in clouds with great power and glory. "From the fig tree learn its lesson: as soon as its branch becomes tender and puts forth its leaves, you know that summer is near. At this time Holy Communion is offered only in one kind. The Host will be placed in the Communicant's hand, not on the tongue. The Celebrant passes through the Congregation bringing the Eucharistic Host to the people at their seats. Please continue to wear your mask as the Celebrant places the Host in your hand, or pronounces a blessing. When he has gone on to the next person, tip your mask to consume the Host.

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PARISH NOTES 29 November 2020 The First Sunday of Advent

Although Covid-19 infection rates in New York City are amongst the lowest in the nation, nevertheless, the pandemic is raging out of control across the country and we have seen sharp rises in infections and test-positivity here. The Bishop of New York, therefore, has imposed new limitations on inperson worship effective immediately.
