

WILLIAM BYRD (C.1540-1623) WAS A REMARKABLE ARTIST, perhaps unique in Tudor and Stuart England. He was a Roman Catholic, patronised by the great recusant families, who also created music for the court, and the official Prayer Book services of the Chapel Royal.

Today we hear Byrd's mass music, rarely performed now in this way in a liturgical context, written for his Roman Catholic patrons. Given our picture of clandestine Roman Catholic worship in the period, facilitated by priests who lived in tiny hidden compartments, we might assume Byrd wrote his grand compositions for continental patrons, free to sing an elaborate mass. We know, however, that these works, including three masses and polyphonic settings of the minor propers, were sung in England, in private chapels, enacted with full vocal and instrumental accompaniment. This creates a much more textured view of the liturgical activity of English Roman Catholics in the period.

In a few weeks we will experience the other side of the coin, when we sing Solemn Evensong and present Byrd's Responses and Great Service, which exemplify Byrd's music for the Church of England.

First Lesson: Ecclesiasticus 44:1-10, 13-14 (all sit)

Let us now praise famous men, and our fathers in their generations. The Lord apportioned to them great glory, his majesty from the beginning. There were those who ruled in their kingdoms, and were men renowned for their power, giving counsel by their understanding, and proclaiming prophecies; leaders of the people in their deliberations and in understanding of learning for the people, wise in their words of instruction; those who composed musical tunes, and set forth verses in writing; rich men furnished with resources, living peaceably in their habitations—all these were honored in their generations, and were the glory of their times. There are some of them who have left a name, so that men declare their praise. And there are some who have no memorial, who have perished as though they had not lived; they have become as though they had not been born, and so have their children after them. But these were men of mercy, whose righteous deeds have not been forgotten; their posterity will continue for ever, and their glory will not be blotted out. THEN I SAW ANOTHER ANGEL ascend from the rising of the sun, with the seal of the living God, and **1** he called with a loud voice to the four angels who had been given power to harm earth and sea, saying, "Do not harm the earth or the sea or the trees, till we have sealed the servants of our God upon their foreheads." And I heard the number of the sealed, a hundred and forty-four thousand sealed, out of every tribe of the sons of Israel. After this I looked, and behold, a great multitude which no man could number, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and tongues, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, clothed in white robes, with palm branches in their hands, and crying out with a loud voice, "Salvation belongs to our God who sits upon the throne, and to the Lamb!" And he said to me, "These are they who have come out of the great tribulation; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. Therefore are they before the throne of God, and serve him day and night within his temple; and he who sits upon the throne will shelter them with his presence. They shall hunger no more, neither thirst any more; the sun shall not strike them, nor any scorching heat. For the Lamb in the midst of the throne will be their shepherd, and he will guide them to springs of living water; and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes."



NOTES ON TODAY'S MUSIC:

This year marks the 400th anniversary of the death of William Byrd, England's most famous 16th-century composer, recusant Catholic, romantic writer of pastoral madrigals, inventor of the verse anthem, and favorite of Elizabeth I. He remains the most versatile of the late Tudor and early Stuart court musicians, and his music ornaments the liturgies of numerous churches, including at Saint Ignatius of Antioch.

Byrd was born in London around 1540, the son of Thomas Byrd. The family was musical; William's brother, Symond, and another older brother, John, are listed as choristers at St. Paul's Cathedral. William was believed to be educated in the Chapel Royal, where he was almost certainly a pupil of Thomas Tallis, with whom he maintained a life-long friendship. In 1563, Byrd was hired at Lincoln Cathedral as Organist and Master of the Choristers and was responsible for the education of the Choristers and supplying "modest" organ accompaniment for cathedral services. Most of Byrd's English liturgical music was composed while he was at Lincoln. Inevitably, a dispute arose between Byrd and the Lincoln

Cathedral Chapter, which involved what was considered by the chapter as inappropriate use of the organ, considering it too "popish." Whatever the specifics of the chapter's displeasure with Byrd, it was resolved by 1574 after he had moved to London.

In 1573, Byrd was appointed a Gentleman of the Chapel Royal, an extremely prestigious post in the musical world of Elizabethan England. He replaced composer Robert Parsons, who died in a tragic drowning in the river Trent near Newark in January of that year. The Chapel Master at the time was Byrd's former teacher, Thomas Tallis, and Byrd quickly became his assistant. In the early years of her reign, Queen Elizabeth was a moderate protestant who dismissed Puritanism and favored a more elaborate and ritualistic liturgy. She was an accomplished musician and is said to have favored the use of Latin in the services in her private chapel. She is famously remembered for insisting on a crucifix and lit candles on her altar, much to the distress of the Puritans at court. Byrd's body of Anglican music is relatively small when compared to his vast output of music, and much of it probably exceeded the limits of elaboration deemed acceptable by the most protestant of the reformers who saw elegant music as a sinful and human distraction from the Word of God.

From the early 1570s, Byrd became increasingly involved with the underground Catholic movement in England, and his closest associates and patrons were among the Catholic nobility at court, who at that time were at least tacitly tolerated. Attendance at Anglican services was required, and despite Elizabeth's promise that it was not her business to look into men's hearts, Byrd's wife was cited for recusancy in 1573, and Byrd himself was on the lists in 1577. Byrd retired to Stondon Massey in 1594 to be close to his Catholic patron, Sir John Petre, at Ingatestone Hall. Sir John was one of the dedicatees of the Gradualia, Byrd's extensive and risky collection of Propers for the Roman Liturgy. Byrd moved to Stondon Massey apparently with the intention of being close to Sir John. The Petre family was and still is, influential among English Catholics and was the recipients of Byrd's musical efforts for the clandestine Catholic liturgies celebrated by his household. Evidence of these years still exists with the numerous priest holes and secret storage areas for vestments, chalices, patens, linens, and other liturgical finery found in these houses. The country house masses were probably the first time that music of the ordinary and propers of the Roman Catholic Mass would have been sung by a choir of both men and women, either the guests or perhaps even the servants of the household. Catholic chronicler, William Weston mentions "an organ and other musical instruments...and, moreover, singers of both sexes, belonging to the house, the master of the house being singularly experienced in that art."

Prior to the English Reformation, music was liturgically bound to the requirements of the Mass and Divine Office. The texts most frequently set in polyphony were those of the Mass, the Magnificat, and the various Office Responds and Hymns. Interestingly, Byrd worked on the English-language protestant setting of the *Great Service* simultaneously with his very Catholic Latin settings of the Ordinary of the Mass and *Gradualia* motets heard in today's service.

Byrd's greatest single achievement is the two volume set of *Gradualia*, a carefully mapped collection of the minor propers, the texts that unlike the five sections of the Mass vary by season or feast day. The first edition was published in 1605, the second in 1607, and both volumes again in 1610. 1605 is a year in which the Protestant/Catholic conflict came to a head ending with the uncovering of the Gunpowder Plot – also known as the Jesuit Treason, in November. The plot was an entirely home-grown plan to assassinate James I. Byrd, as well as the Petre family, were always loyal British subjects who happened to be Catholic. However, Byrd's position was made even more tenuous because one of the accused even had a copy of *Gradualia* in his possession. In any case, the first edition was withdrawn, the second delayed

and when they were reprinted in 1610, the title pages had been revised and carefully reworded to remove any obvious directions for Catholic liturgical use. The first book of *Gradualia* contains the four propers for All Saints Sunday (*Gaudeamus omnes*, *Timete Dominum*, *Justorum animae*, and *Beati mundo corde*). The propers of the day are commonly sung as plainchant here at Saint Ignatius, occasionally supplanted by a motet setting; or, augmented by another Latin motet or English anthem. Today as a special treat we sing all of the propers in Byrd's motet versions as well as the beautiful *Mass for Five Voices* including the *Credo*, rather than our usual congregational plainchant version of the Nicene Creed.

When Byrd died on July 4, 1623, his death was noted in the Chapel Royal Cheque Book as that of "a Father of Musick." He was rivaled by no other English composer and was the teacher of subsequent generations as Tallis had taught him. It was this line, from teacher to pupil, which preserved a unique and enduring legacy of church music. We owe a great debt to those who preserved the manuscripts and printed editions of his music and are indeed fortunate to be able to perform his magnificent legacy.
